- What is the Waterloo Region Rainbow Coalition?
 - Founded in Fall 2010 with the specific purpose of hosting 3 Community Conversations to encourage dialogue amongst the rainbow community.
 - Identified need to develop a framework to support sustainable development of the local rainbow community.
 - WRRC has been meeting approximately bi-weekly since January 2011 to "set the foundation" for sustainable rainbow community development.

Mission

— WRRC is a volunteer-based community organization that is committed to building a unified voice for gender and sexual diversity for people of all ages in Waterloo Region. Which Dreams Do We Pursue?

What was the most enlightening thing you learned from the small group discussion?

- The need to bring information/history to the younger generation.
- The clear enthusiasm and passion for change that exists in the community.
- The number and make-up of people participating in this evening's discussion.
 - Many resources represented.
 - Different ages and diversity of participants.
 - Participation from governmental representatives (Ken Seiling).
- Feeling safe and included in the discussion.



What were the two dreams that your group felt were the hardest and easiest to achieve?

Hardest

- Getting the diverse community together (age, segregated groups by identity)
- Educating the educators/administrators/ policy makers
- Broad goals that are difficult to measure
- Corporate sponsorships (local companies)
- Sustainable Management
- Involving youth
- Resistance to change
- Advocacy
- Rainbow history and cultural transmission

Easiest

- Community Centre-Physical Space
- Educating/advocating to organizations we have already partnered with
- Sharing/using resources we already have
- Online presence
- Political support
- Advocacy/action for school system/GSAs



What elements of these dreams made them the hardest or easiest to achieve?

- Already there or existing
- Funding
- Getting help from partner associations (for space, etc.)
- Willingness to share versus sense of ownership
- Commitment (Personal)
- Combating social stigma
- Bringing everyone together (generations)
- Degree of visibility



What were the two dreams that members of each group seemed most personally interesting in actively making a reality?

- Physical Community Centre
- Advocacy on behalf of Rainbow Youth within the school system
- Opportunities for Networking
 - Between existing groups
 - More opportunities for social interactions
 - Professional/Business
 - Increased community interaction will help promote community unity

 - Promote reciprocal site listings- linking to other organizations and asking them to link to us.
 - Ask for local organizations to blog on the site.
- Get information out to community partners and ask them to share the information with their constituents.




What are some ways that we can reach out and engage the local Rainbow community?

- Community Outreach Finding people willing to go out to where the community is and spreading the word.
 - Local Establishments/Events: Sizzle, Club
 Renaissance, GLOW, Rainbow Centre,
 ACCKWA, Out on the Shelf, Conestoga College
 - One-on-one interactions
 - Affirming Church Congregations (e.g., Parkminster)
 - Presence at local festivals: Take Back the Night, Multicultural, LINK, triPride, Nonviolence, Rainbow Reels



What are some ways that we can reach out and engage the local Rainbow community?

- Find opportunities to build credibility within the local community
 - Have pictures and names pm websites and communications to create a visual association between issues and *real* people.
